life journey of Pasang Lhamu Sherpa, will be shown in New York from today. Pasang Lhamu Sherpa made history on April 22, 1993 by becoming the first Nepali woman to climb Mount Everest. Produced by writer Sharon Wood and directed by Nancy Svendsen, the documentary skillfully weaves together the inspiring, courageous and tragic story of Pasang's life.



The documentary will be screened at Cinema Village in New York City's Greenwich Village from January 19th to 25th, and then at <u>the New Plaza Cinema on the Upper West</u> Side from January 27th to 28th, offering an in-depth exploration of Pasang's life. The portrait highlights the various stages of his life.

From breaking social norms in a conservative Nepali family to running away and getting married at the age of 17, facing family disapproval for marriage, learning English and actively participating in her husband's business, the documentary covers topics such as. The portrait includes a love for mountain climbing and his early mountaineering experiences in France, including Mount Blaine in particular.

Pasang's steadfast determination and resilience are shown through the film. Especially in her attempts to climb Mt. Everest, despite facing repeated failures, she remained steadfast and decided to make a fourth attempt in 1993 by leading the Nepal-India joint expedition. On 22 April 1933, Pasang Lhamu Sherpa achieved her dream of standing on the summit of Mount Everest, a historic moment for Nepalese women. Unfortunately, she lost her life while going down. However, his body was successfully recovered from Mount Everest.



Pasang's life is a poignant example of resilience, determination and breaking gender barriers. She has become a symbol of Nepali women's ability and strength. She has also become a symbol of courage. The documentary captures the essence of her tireless efforts while emphasizing the importance of pursuing one's dreams with dedication even in the face of many challenges and obstacles. The documentary features interviews with people who knew him, famous alpinists and Pasang.


Pasang Lhamu Sherpa climbed from the south face of Mt. She died while returning from the summit of Mount Everest with her husband Sonam Chiring. Before climbing Everest, she had climbed Mont Blanc, Cho Yu and other mountains. He was born in Chaurikhark, Lukla Surke 4 of Solukhumbu District in November 2017. Pita Phurwa Kitar Sherpas started walking from the tender age of 14, carrying a small pot. Pasang, the only daughter of two brothers and two brothers, was completely involved in the trekking profession in 1979. In 1990, Jamarco climbed Mt. Everest for two consecutive years without failure.

Honoring the Sahas of Pasang Lhamu, the Government of Nepal has declared him the National Bibhuti of Nepal. The government declared Sherpa as a national monument on 10th Baisakh, 2059. After his death, the Government of Nepal awarded him the Nepal Star. Besides this, a full-length portrait of him and a postage stamp with his photograph have also been published. The Pasang Lhamu Mountaineering Foundation is also running in his name.



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She became the 17th woman in the world and the first woman from Nepal to climb Everest on the flag vehicle of Nepal. Passang died while returning after the climb. After his death, Pasang was awarded the prestigious Nepal Star. Postage stamps bearing his image were introduced. The 7,351 meter high Jasamba peak under the Namche Village Development Committee of Eastern Nepal was also named Pasang Lhamu Chuli.

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
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
